Family First Center moves towards goal

I t began two years ago as a shared vision between Mayor Denis Law and Doug Baldwin of the Seattle Seahawks: a family-oriented community center in the Cascade/Benson Hill neighborhood.

Today that vision is moving towards reality as the proposed Family First Community Center has received funding from a variety of sources and is working towards reaching its funding goal.

The \$15 million project is a partnership between the City of Renton, Seattle Seahawks Doug Baldwin, Renton School District and HealthPoint, a healthcare provider that will provide services.

The center has received \$4 million from Renton City Council, \$3 million from First Financial Northwest Foundation, and King County Council donated \$75,000 from surplus Kingdome funds. Additionally Car Pros, a Renton-based auto dealership, is making a donation for each car sold. Renton School District is planning to provide land next to Cascade Elementary School for the center.

Family First Community Center will meet a need for recreation services for families and youth by offering a host of programs including sports and recreation, health and wellness, plus classes in technology, music and English as a second language.

Baldwin was a Cascade/Benson Hill area resident during his rookie year and noticed the number of kids who had no real place to go after school. Over the next several months the partners will launch a full-fledged capital campaign to solicit additional partners and funds, develop a design for the center, and establish programs.

Civic Core project enters review stage

Vision planning for the Downtown Civic Core has reached the review stage. After a year-long series of community meetings with interested residents, business owners and other stakeholders, the Vision and Action Plan will be presented to the city's planning commission during two meetings this month. The project will then proceed to City Council for adoption in December.

The plan will cover the Downtown Business District, with a special concentration within the Civic Core area. Elements of the proposed plan include:

- Reconfiguration of the Event Center, Transit Center area, and Piazza and Gateway parks
- Creation of a festival street along Logan Avenue and S. Third Street connecting Piazza and Gateway parks

- Reconfiguration of Burnett Avenue S. between S. Second and S. Fifth streets, to connect the Burnett Linear Park North and South and add bike facilities
- Creation of "river streets" along northsouth streets to connect east-west streets more directly to the Cedar River
- Temporary pop-up retail, food spots and events to fill in vacant storefronts and lots
- Management plan for downtown's public parking

The plan also recommends a wayfinding concept consisting of a series of decorative directional signs that help residents and visitors find their destination or discover a new one. More information about the project can be found at www.rentonciviccore.com.

Secure your property prior to a flood

loods are highly unpredictable and one of the most common hazards in the United States. The National Weather Service notes that 75 percent of all presidential disaster declarations are directly related to flooding. Floods are brought on by severe weather conditions, such as heavy rainfall from storms and the melting of snow and ice. Although they cannot be controlled, prevented or predicted, there are steps you can take to prepare your property.

ALERTS The King County Flood Warning System continuously monitors the weather forecasts and river conditions. They notify City of Renton's Emergency Management Department when a nearby river reaches flood stage. Individuals can receive emergency alerts, including potential hazards, threats or evacuation notices, by registering for Alert King County at bit.ly/AlertsKC. To receive on-going river-level conditions, download King County's flood warning app.

FLOOD PLAINS Find out if your property is in a flood-prone area, obtain a Flood Insurance Rate Map or obtain copies of current Flood Elevation Certificates by calling 425-430-7392.

INSURANCE National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) offers homeowners flood insurance, as most homeowner's or renter's insurance policies do not cover losses due to flooding. NFIP's average flood insurance policy is about \$300 a year (\$25 month) for approximately \$100,000 in coverages.

Premiums can be lowered by asking NFIP about a 25% policy discount, part of a partnership the city has with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

To report your property's condition or obtain assistance, contact City of Renton Maintenance Services Division at 425-430-7400.

Emergency services are provided around the clock for the reporting of flooding, hazardous road conditions, down or damaged traffic signs, no water, sewer overflow or water main breaks. For emergencies occurring after 3:30 p.m. weekdays or on the weekends, and needing immediate attention, please call 9-1-1.

City crews prep for winter weather

Threats of snow and ice are coming soon. The city's Public Works
Department's Maintenance Services
Division is ready.

Winter preparations were actually completed in early October when the division tested its fleet of ten plows, nine sanders, and three anti-icing trucks. Our drivers have traveled the routes to identify hazards that might be obscured by snow and have loaded their trucks with needed equipment. On-hand to help manage winter road conditions are 250 tons of road salt, 1,000 tons of sand and 9,000 gallons of de-icer. During snow and ice events, our sanders and plows are first dispatched to keep major arterials open. Information on how the city maintains

Housing Repair Assistance Program

Program provides free minor health and safety repairs to owneroccupied homes within the city limits, where the household income is less than the maximum annual limits.

Some of the repairs provided include roof and plumbing leaks, mold and moisture elimination, pest control, ventilation, safety installations (hand grabs, safety lighting, wheelchair ramps), drinking water systems, waste water, and replacement of CFL lighting with LED lighting.

Because the aim of the program is to ensure the health and safety of you and your family, the program does not cover such items as carports, freestanding garages, or fences.

Eligible homeowners must meet three

- 1. Live within the Renton City limits
- 2. Own the home for at least the last 12 months
- 3. Have a total household adjusted gross income that is less than the Maximum Annual Income limits

Income limits and an application form can be found on the city website along with links to other resources.
