Prepare before an emergency strikes

We all know disasters happen. Where we quibble is over how many days we should plan for surviving on our own. Even if emergency responders had magical powers, there just aren't enough of them to be everywhere and the roads might be undriveable.

So, guess what? You could be eating out of your emergency kit by the light of a glow stick for days. We aren't anticipating a never-ending zombie apocalypse, but your preparedness target is a lot longer than we used to recommend.

Remember the good ol' days of being prepared for three days? That's fine, if you're talking about a wind storm or a minor snow fall, but that won't cut it after a big disaster. The website makeitthrough.org has raised the bar: 7–10 days is the new goal thanks to the Cascadia Subduction Zone earthquake risk. The Red Cross goes even further and says plan for up to two weeks. TWO WEEKS? Okay, so do what you can, and let comfort be your guide. If you want to live off of your fat stores, that's up to you. But please don't take a chance with pets, children, or other vulnerable individuals.

Another news flash: you may find yourself in an information blackout during a disaster if you haven't planned ahead. You may not be able to answer a text from a loved one for hours or days. Landlines may be out and cell towers will definitely be overloaded.

That's where a communication plan comes in. Decide where you are going to meet if you can't communicate. Designate



an out-of-area contact that requires a long-distance call—those circuits are sometimes still working even when the local ones are toast. Hint: don't store that number only in your cell phone. Batteries die. Carry it in your wallet.

Here's the scoop on where to get emergency information that you can share with others:

- Bookmark the city's website, rentonwa.gov, to find out about serious hazards, location of shelters, major road closures, food and water distribution, sewer system status, etc. You know, important stuff.
- Sign up for alerts for your phone and/ or email at www.kingcounty.gov/ALERT. It's FREE!
- Find the location of your low-tech Neighborhood Information Center (most Renton School District schools have one of these bulletin boards at their main entrance) and go there for info when all those high tech capabilities come crashing down and nothing's on the Internet.

- Follow the smokin' hot, fresh Renton Emergency Management social media posts on Facebook, Twitter and Nextdoor, then share them widely.
- Get a NOAA Weather Radio, preferably the programmable kind that will let you choose the specific alerts to receive (conventional TV and radio are typically slower to turn around the information).

Share the message with others. Shout if from the rooftops, wave your arms, gesture wildly, share it on social media—whatever it takes to help others understand the dangers and what they can do to be safe. If you really want to get their attention, put on your superhero cape and tights and snap a selfie to go along with it. That may be all it takes to save a life.

Got unwanted stuff? Clean Sweep it

lean Sweep, a collaboration between the city and Republic Services, allows single-family residential customers to dispose of unwanted items for free.

Republic Services garbage customers in Renton can schedule a one-time pickup, consisting of up to 10 32-gallon units. Each unit cannot exceed 65 pounds and must be less than three feet in length on each side. Two bulky items, such as mattresses, sofas or chairs, will also be accepted. Hazardous waste, liquid waste, and items that can be recycled will not be accepted. Examples include

appliances, electronics, yard waste, and construction materials.

Clean Sweep runs from September 1 to December 29. For more information and to schedule your pickup, visit rentonwa.gov/cleansweep.
