Don't Let Winter Catch You Unprepared

Emergency Management offers these reminders to get your family, home and car ready

A s the cooler days of fall and winter approach, consider the potential for winter hazards and be prepared. Even though the National Weather Service has predicted a weak La Niña winter, don't let the word 'weak' fool you. We could still see significant storms or flood events in the Puget Sound area. It is important to get ready for winter weather now. Here are some tips.

PERSONAL PREPAREDNESS

- Talk about an emergency plan with your family. How will you communicate in an emergency? Do you have alternate routes home?
- Dress in layers. Several thin layers are better than one thick layer.
- Wear appropriate and warm footwear. Waterproof boots with non-skid soles are best.



- Write down emergency contact information and keep it in your wallet or purse. If your phone dies, will you remember important numbers?
- Store extra food and water for your pet and identify pet-friendly hotels or places to stay in case you have to leave your home.
- Sign up for flood alerts at www. kingcounty.gov/flood or 206-477-4899.

AT HOME

- Assemble an emergency kit. Include food, water, medical supplies, flashlights, and warm clothes to last for up to two weeks.
- Unblock rain gutters, repair cracks and leaks, and clear debris that are in danger of falling on your house or vehicle.

HOMELESS

Homeless services in King County can be reached

by calling 2-1-1. In Renton, the Center of Hope (COH) is available to single women and mothers with children. The day center is located at City Hall and open weekdays, 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Case management, laundry, showers, and food is available. The overnight shelter is at local churches. You can help the families at the COH during the holidays; volunteers are also needed Friday through Sunday for the dinner served at Daystar Church. For more information: 425-277-7594.

- Winterize with sound insulation, weather-stripping frames, storm windows and caulking.
- Insulate pipes or turn faucets on to a slow drip to prevent freezing.
- Install smoke and carbon monoxide alarms and test them monthly.
 Replace batteries annually.
- Do not use portable generators, charcoal grills, or camp stoves inside. Improper use can lead to fatal carbon monoxide poisoning.

ON THE ROAD

- Check that your car is in good condition, including the battery, anti-freeze, tires and wiper fluid and blades.
- Keep seasonal emergency supplies in the car along with your regular emergency kit, including sand or kitty litter, an ice scraper, tire chains, winter boots and a small shovel.
- Avoid driving during heavy snowfall or storms when possible.
- Never drive through a flood. A few inches of moving water can sweep away your vehicle.
- Make sure your fuel tank is at least half full.
- Don't leave your car running unattended, even for a brief period of time.

Secure Your Property Prior to a Flood

Loods are highly unpredictable and one of the most common hazards in the United States. The National Weather Service notes that 75 percent of all presidential disaster declarations are directly related to flooding. Floods are brought on by severe weather conditions, such as heavy rainfall from storms and the melting of snow and ice. Although they cannot be controlled, prevented or predicted, there are steps you can take to prepare your property.

ALERTS The King County Flood Warning System continuously monitors the weather forecasts and river conditions. They notify the City of Renton Emergency Department when the nearby rivers reach flood stage. Individuals can receive emergency alerts, including potential hazards, threats or evacuation notices, by registering for Alert King County at bit.ly/ AlertsKC. To receive on-going river-level conditions, download the King County Flood Warning app.

FLOOD PLAINS To find out if your property is in a flood-prone area, obtain a Flood Insurance Rate Map or copies of current Flood Elevation Certificates call 425-430-7392. **INSURANCE** National Flood Insurance Program (NFIP) offers homeowners flood insurance, as most homeowner's or renter's insurance policies do not cover losses due to flooding. NFIP's average flood insurance policy is about \$300 a year (\$25 month) for approximately \$100,000 in coverages.

Premiums can be lowered by asking NFIP about a 25% policy discount, part of a partnership the city has with the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).

To report your property's condition or obtain assistance, contact the City of Renton Maintenance Services Division at 425-430-7400.

Emergency services are provided around the clock for the reporting of flooding, hazardous road conditions, downed or damaged traffic signs, no water, sewer overflow or water main breaks. For emergencies occurring after 3:30 p.m., weekdays or on the weekends, that need immediate attention, please call 9-1-1.




Nov. 26 is Small Business Saturday

WHAT TO DO WITH THOSE LEFTOVER POLITICAL SIGNS

The Renton Municipal Code (RMC 4-4-100.J.4) calls for the removal of all political signs within 14 days following a general election. After that time the city may pick up and dispose of such signs and the candidates, candidate representative, or proposition sponsor shall be subject to a monetary penalty of \$100 per sign, up to a total of \$10,000, and loss of the signs.

UTILITY BILLING ASSISTANCE

Renton offers reduced rates for water, wastewater, surface water and garbage for low-income senior citizens (61 and over) and low-income disabled residents. Contact Utility Billing Customer Service at 425-430-6852.
