Multicultural Festival brings world to Renton

Join with your neighbors and friends as the city presents the third annual Renton Multicultural Festival on September 14 and 15. It will be two days that showcase the best of the city's diverse and vibrant community.

Opening night features a variety of performances ranging from the Samoan Haka and traditional Cuban music to Irish step dancing and South Indian classical dance at Carco Theatre from 6 to 9 p.m.

The festival moves to the Renton Pavilion Event Center on Saturday from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. and will feature music and dance from around the world. The day will also include cultural activities, food trucks, arts and crafts, and storytelling.

Admission to this family-friendly event is



free, as is parking on both days. The City Center Garage will have two hours of free parking on Saturday.

The Renton Multicultural Festival is presented by the City of Renton

How you can be "Ready in Renton"

A fter a large disaster, normal ways to communicate—like cell phones or Internet—might not be available. But there are still ways to get information.

ALERT Renton is the city's emergency notification system to get life-safety messages directly to residents via phone or TDD, text, or emails. Most of King County uses the same ALERT system for widespread notification coverage. Sign up is free and secure at rentonwa.gov/alert.

If emergency notifications aren't able to go out via ALERT Renton or social media accounts, volunteers will try to post important information at **Neighborhood Information Center** boards, located by the front entrance of most schools in the Renton School District, and the Maplewood Golf Course. Visit rentonwa.gov/alert for an interactive map. The city will also post emergency information at rentonwa.gov/emergencyinfo as soon as possible.

Communities that work together are more resilient to disasters. Get prepared and encourage others. Share your communications plan with neighbors, coworkers, and loved ones. Information for non-English

GREEN IS GOOD

Every day city staff work to make Renton a "Green City." From energy-efficient street lights to recycling construction debris, the city works to lessen the impact on the environment. Visit rentonwa.gov/videos to learn more about the efforts.

Are you recycling right? Here's a test

PROPER RECYCLING provides clean, recoverable materials that don't burden the recycling system.

DO:

UNBAG RECYCLABLES. Bagging items hinders sorting at the

recycling facility.

COLLAPSE CARDBOARD BOXES. Carts and trucks can accept more recyclables if we flatten all cardboard.

EMPTY AND CLEAN CONTAINERS. Residue in containers causes

contamination and may prevent items from being recycled.

DO NOT PUT IN RECYCLE BINS:

LOOSE PLASTIC BAGS AND WRAP. They tangle machinery and significantly slow down recycling. Recycle plastic bags at participating grocery stores.

FOOD-SOILED CONTAINERS. Dirty

take-out containers go in the garbage. Pizza boxes can go in food and yard waste containers, if you have them, or in the garbage.

STYROFOAM/POLYSTYRENE. Styrofoam

is not accepted in the city's curbside recycling program. Recycle it at a city recycling event (next event is September 15), at Styro Recycle in Kent, or at Bow Lake Recycling and Transfer Station in Tukwila. You can also drop off Styrofoam packing peanuts for reuse at UPS stores.

Changes come to transit center



You'll notice two changes at the downtown transit center.

First, six "Big Belly" receptacles have been installed as part of the city's efforts to reduce litter. The cans were provided at no cost by King County/Metro and contain automatic solar powered trash



compactors, allowing the cans to hold five times more waste than a regular waste can.

Second, windscreen panels on several transit shelters have been removed and the seats reconfigured to create a more inviting seating area.

Specialized Recreation program



The City of Renton has a very strong Specialized Recreation program that offers field trips, sports, and social activities.

So far in 2018, participants have played basketball with the Seattle Storm and football with the Seahawks, attended the National Summer Special Olympics Games, held a prom, toured the Renton Farmers Market, and assisted the Renton Police Department in establishing the "Take Me Home Program." Later this year are trips to one of Renton's fire stations to learn about hazardous materials and to the Renton Airport, home to the Boeing 737.

The Renton Historical Society will receive \$23,116 to upgrade the museum and the theater will receive \$78,245 to restore seating and improve accessibility.
