Protecting the environment

Preserving and protecting the natural beauty we enjoy here in Renton gets more than lip service from the city.

City staff have been leaders in implementing programs designed to save residents money, protect the environment, and promote reuse and recycling.

- Renton's first-of-its-kind automated water meter reading system monitors over 18,000 meters and has identified leaks that could have cost property owners approximately \$430,000.
- Renton was one of the first cities in the state to replace street lights with LED lights, saving hundreds of thousands of dollars annually. LED lights last longer.
- A comprehensive recycling and composting program has diverted nearly 230,000 tons from landfills.

Inside this edition of Renton CityNews are several tips residents can implement to save money. They're easy to implement and range from installing low-flush toilets to free events that repair household items.

Renton has several hidden treasures right in downtown that protect the environment and provide a retreat into nature.

The Black River Riparian Forest and wetland is home to over 50 species of birds, including one of the largest blue heron colonies in the region.

The Springbrook Creek Wetland Mitigation Bank is a joint project with the state and is a great place to walk and view wildlife.

City gets AAA bond rating

Renton has received a AAA rating for general obligation bonds by S&P Global. AAA is the highest financial rating a city can achieve.

"S&P's rating is a reflection of how we have managed our money, strengthened our reserves, and found solutions to challenges that affect the city budget," said Mayor Denis Law.

The AAA bond rating will allow the city to pay the lowest available interest rates when borrowing funds. This has a two-fold benefit for the city: saving taxpayers money and freeing up funding for critical municipal infrastructure projects.

The city will use a majority of the proceeds of the series 2019 bonds to improve parks and recreation opportunities and to fund transportation and utility infrastructure improvements.

S&P's report praised the city for more than doubling the available general fund reserves and believes the city will continue to experience strong revenue growth consistent with strong economic momentum in the region.

"S&P has confirmed what we've known,

that Renton has become a sought-after place to invest, locate business, and to live and raise families," said Mayor Law. "Several nationally known businesses call Renton home and we have millions of dollars in projects under construction or in the planning stages. The future of Renton is very strong."

CITY OFFERING FREE GUN LOCKS

The city, with support from Renton Police Department, is offering free gun locks to residents on Saturday, April 20, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. at Renton Community Center.

Safe firearm storage protects children, reduces the risk of injury and saves lives. Please do not bring your firearm to the event as police firearms instructors will demonstrate how to correctly install the lock.

There is a limited supply of locks, so be sure to arrive early. One lock per person.



STREAM Team empowers youth

STREAM Team is a Recreation and Neighborhoods division program that provides high-quality, culturally appropriate after-school programming in science, technology, reading, recreation, environment, arts and math at Highlands Neighborhood Center for youth ages 5 to 14.

The program is offered weekdays throughout the year and is designed to empower youth with the skills to be socially, emotionally, and academically successful throughout their academic careers. Funding comes through a grant from King County's Best Starts for Kids Out-of-School-Time Program, coordinated through School's Out Washington. The Environmental Science Center, Centro Rendu, and Techbridge Girls are partners. More information is available at rentonwa.gov/streamteam.





Everyday ways to protect the environment

REDUCE

Water-efficient toilets use 60 to 80 percent less water than older models. In 2018, Renton residents updated 741 toilets. Residents may receive a \$100 rebate by installing a qualifying toilet that uses 1.1 gallons or less per flush. savingwater.org/rebates

Turning off the water while shaving or brushing teeth can save seven gallons of water. Installing an aerator can cut water use by 30 percent. Puget Sound Energy offers rebates. pse.com/rebates/water-savings

Shredded paper is no longer accepted in residential recycling or organics due to contamination issues. Shred documents with sensitive information and sign up for e-bills. Renton Police Department's Shred-a-Thon is Saturday, April 27, 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. at Boeing S1 Lot.

HELP PROTECT OUR WATER SUPPLY

Rain that falls on our roofs, driveways and streets picks up everything it touches like oil, yard chemicals and pet waste left on the surface. The contaminated rain water flows into storm drains and then into our creeks, rivers and lakes.

Help keep Renton waters clean and healthy. Check for and fix car leaks, practice

Help keep Renton waters clean and healthy. Check for and fix car leaks, practice natural yard care, pick up after your pet, and remember, "Only Rain Down the Drain!" Learn more at rentonwa.gov/cleanstormwater.





Prevent expensive repairs to your drain and sewer pipes by disposing of food scraps in the compost bin instead of the sink disposal. A build up of fats, oils and grease (FOG) from foods and cooking oil can cause problems in both residential and public sewer systems. If there is no access to compost, discard food scraps in the garbage. rentonwa.gov/wastewater

Wash vehicles at commercial washes where wastewater goes to treatment plants. Water from vehicles washed in streets and driveways flows directly into storm drains and then into streams, rivers and lakes, contaminating waters.

Volunteer to install storm drain markers and distribute educational materials on Saturday, April 27 as part of the city's Arbor Day/Earth Day celebration. Drain markers are an important reminder that only rain goes down storm drains. Register at rentonwa.gov/volunteer.

Report oil or hazardous spills to 911 and all other spills to 425-430-7400. One quick call keeps neighborhoods and waterways clean and healthy.

RECYCLE

Plastic bags are no longer accepted in residential recycling as they contaminate materials. Recycle plastic bags, wraps and films at many stores, including all major grocery stores in Renton. how2recycle.info/sdo

Recycle stained or torn clothes, shoes and linens. Wet, mildewed or contaminated items are not accepted. Find Renton locations at kingcounty.gov/threadcycle.

Recycle paints including latex, water-based stains and clear finishes at Ace Hardware stores in Renton. Fee is per container: \$2.99 for quarts, \$4.99 for gallons, \$22.99 for 5-gallons. bit.ly/latexpaintrecycle
