



Neighborhood Recognition

The City of Renton wants to recognize the unique neighborhoods in the community and support their health and vitality. When your neighborhood is officially recognized by the city, it receives:

- » A city liaison to work with your neighborhood
- » Eligibility for funding for neighborhood picnics
- » Information about your neighborhood on the city's website
- » Publicity for neighborhood events on Channel 21, the city's cable access station

Neighborhood Picnics

Neighborhood picnics were created to encourage neighbors to gather together to honor the uniqueness and accomplishments of their neighborhood; to create a forum to discuss neighborhood ideas, issues and concerns; and to get to know each other better.

Once a year, neighborhoods can apply for matching funds from the city for their picnics. Neighborhood picnics are held between May and September (major holidays excluded) in cooperation with recognized neighborhood groups.

Neighborhood Grant Program

The Neighborhood Grant Program offers matching funds to neighborhood groups and associations for projects that will enhance the viability and livability of their neighborhoods.

Some examples of grant projects that have been funded include identity signage for neighborhood entry points, landscaping of traffic island and streetscapes, community gardens, and entryway improvements.
