CITY STAFF HAVE SPENT the last several months proactively reaching out to provide much needed human service resources to the homeless and near homeless in Renton. This Friday, Nov. 8 they will host another of these events from 10:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at the downtown Renton Library. Our staff have collaborated with local healthcare, housing, public transportation, human services and infant care



providers, bringing them under one roof and making it easier to receive assistance. Friday's event will also offer free flu shots for those 18 and older.

As our weather turns toward winter, the work of local civic organizations like the <u>Kiwanis Club</u> of Renton becomes vital.

It was about one year ago I cut the ribbon officially opening the new location of their clothing bank. It was a milestone as they were entering into their 50th year of serving Renton, most of those years without a permanent home. The clothes bank assists more than 8,000 children and families each year and they do it by relying on support from the community through volunteers and contributions of money and clothing.
